Kevin and John, are regular visitors to Shopfront, they come to share a cup of coffee, grab something to eat, have a chat and enjoy each others company. Their individual stories are very different, yet they represent the experiences of many who call the Shopfront "home".

"I came from Holland as a boy and couldn't speak English, so I had trouble fitting in. When I was young my mother, a violent person, wasn't nice to me. It's funny, I never had a problem with alcohol, I don't drink – never have... it's drugs that ruined my life for so long.

I tried marijuana, harder drugs and eventually, heroin. It made me steal and got me 8 months in jail. I'd been on the streets in Perth for years. Then I met a girl, she got pregnant and we had a beautiful baby daughter. That's what saved me.

My partner couldn't get off the drugs, but I knew I had to take care of my little girl. She's 9 years old now, we don't have a lot but we do the best we can. I make sure she's healthy, happy and knows that she's loved. That's what my life is... it's her.

Shopfront helps us with the things we can't afford and we always have a friendly face here if we need help. It's a real calming place, I like that" said Kevin.

John, a quiet man, a good man, is always on hand to help out at the centre with whatever needs doing.

John said "Mate, I had a bad motor bike accident as a young bloke. I was in a coma for months and I have trouble with my memory. I can't work and it makes life tough, you know. I am a fairly calm sort of person, I don't get stressed and I don't need a lot to get by, but things are getting bad now.

You know I pay \$150 a week rent which leaves me bugger all for food, clothes, medical things.

Without Shopfront, I just wouldn't be able to manage to eat every day. This is my home, the people here are my friends and I feel they know what I am going through".

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"I first visited **The Shopfront** about three or four I was on my own, working to support the five of us and going there for awhile.

I have to say that when I walked in and saw the people sitting there, it was a bit confronting at first.

But I soon started chatting to one person, then another and another, and I soon realised... they were just like me, people who need help and someone to care.

In a nutshell, my life has not been easy or what I suppose most people would call "normal". My childhood was traumatic; I'm the oldest of ten (now eleven) and we were exposed to domestic violence.

My mother brought us to Western Australia, I trained and became a registered nurse. I met a man, married and had four wonderful children.

After 12 years of marriage, suddenly it was over.

years ago, at the urging of someone who had been fighting a distressing battle with my husband through the courts.

> It all became too much, I suppose I just burnt out... life wore me down. I suffered mentally and had a breakdown of sorts, brought on by stress.

> I lost my job, my children were living with their father, I found it difficult to keep accommodation and I lost my way.

> I never thought this would be my story. I was what I suppose you'd call a typical "middle-class" woman; someone educated who had a good job, a family.

> I was raised a Catholic but had drifted away, but I always remember what I was taught by the nuns when I was just 5 years old, that God loved all children, that we all had special gifts and were unique and I have carried that message in my heart these 40 odd years.



I know that this must be true. He has most certainly restored me and continues restoring me every day.

At the Shopfront, I found friends who cared about me - Julie Williams and Brother Peter, the other "visitors" who come each day, just like me, and all the volunteers. They are just so welcoming, so caring. They helped me **Today**, I have reunited and reconnected think positively about life again.

They have become like family to me, a real family.

I always had an interest in drug and alcohol rehabilitation, so I enrolled in study at TAFE and completed a Community Services Certificate IV. I even undertook my practical at the centre.



The Shopfront is also where I met Bill.

Though two different people, we connected. Friendship developed over time and eventually turned to love. In December 2008, our beautiful baby boy, Tim, was born. He is a Blessing, a joy... our joy.

with my four older children, who now fuss and delight over their new brother. I have a home and I am working towards making a better life for me, and all my children.

This simply would not have been possible without the support of everyone at Shopfront. They have been with me, and continue to be with me, on every step of my journey.

At my darkest hour, just like lob when he lost everything, God restored me and he continues restoring me each and every day.

The greatest gift that the Shopfront has given me is **HOPE**. How can you repay that?", said Michelle.
