Beverley (she prefers Bev) is a remarkable woman and mother. She has faced, and continues to face, many challenges in her life - challenges most of us could not possibly imagine.

She starts each day with an absolute determination to care and provide for her 6 children (ages 4 to 21) and to make sure they stay together. Family means everything to Bev. She believes you can cope with anything life dishes out, as long as you have each other and love each other enough.

Married at an early age, Bev and her husband never had much. They lived in public housing with their (at the time) 2 young children, but didn't have the maturity or the knowledge to properly care for their home. Due to cultural and some acknowledged behavioural issues, they lost tenancy of their home.

With no savings, they found it impossible to rent a home in the private market. So in her early 20's, Bev, her husband and their children found themselves homeless.

Bev said:


"It was frightening. We lived in our car, in parks, stayed with friends and family members but I never thought that we would end up homeless for more than 10 years. Can you believe that - 10 years!

I tried everything and everywhere to get help. I went to every department and agency I could find, and while we did get a few nights motel accommodation and the such, we never found a home. My husband would come in and out of our lives. I can't blame him, it was hard for him as a man to see what was happening to his family.

I started doing drugs to numb the pain I was feeling. I feel sorry that I turned to drugs, but I couldn't stand it anymore, you know. I ran into trouble and was sent to the Bandyup Women's Prison. I lost my children to welfare. This was the lowest point for me, the end. But it was also a beginning.

I met Leanne (Leanne Strommen, Executive Manager of Centrecare Gosnells) after being referred by DCS following my release from Bandyup; she and so many other people at Centrecare started helping me in so many ways. They provided temporary accommodation, drug counselling, family support, and helped with all the government agencies red tape.

I slowly started to put my life and my family back together.

Thanks to Centrecare, my kids and I now have a beautiful Department of Housing home. My case worker Krystina says I am the best tenant in WA because my home is always so neat, tidy and well cared for. When you've been homeless and you finally get a place to call your own, then you appreciate it and enjoy it, you know.

Look, me and the kids still don't have a lot and there are times when food and other stuff is in short supply, but we are together, we love each other, and we are trying real hard. Centrecare continues to help support me, encourage me, and be there for me and the kids. They have changed my life over the past 2 years".

Editor's Comment:

I asked Bev if she could have one wish what that might be. She thought for a moment and said rather quietly..."My own home, one I owned that would always be mine, no matter what".

DOING THE BEST I CAN...

This is Peter's story, in his own words....

I began smoking marijuana at just 10 years old. I never thought I'd end up using heroin, because I was always scared of needles to be honest. When I was 16 and drunk at a party, some guy injected me with heroin.

That was all it took for me to start using.

At first, I took it on Friday nights, then weekends and eventually every day. I had a great job in the carbon crushing One day, I received a call from welfare officers industry and earned really good money, so I could afford it informing me that Dylan could no longer live with at first. When I needed more, because I had a good credit his Mum. rating I took out a \$15,000 personal loan, which all went on drugs. My girlfriend at the time hated heroin, so I changed Thankfully my parents were granted temporary custody to speed. and I was given time to prove that I could care for Dylan.

At just 23 years of age, I became a father.

My son Dylan was a beautiful baby however he was born with an intellectual disability.

Doctors told us Dylan's brain would develop slower than normal, which meant by the time he was eight, he would be at the same level of learning as a 3 year old.

My partner and I had a fairly up and down relationship, we were always fighting and arguing and I just couldn't take it anymore. So when Dylan was 5 years old, I left and moved back in with my parents. Dylan and his mum moved into a refuge for single mothers.

Six long months later, I was granted custody, which was the happiest day of my life mate.

That's what first lead me to Centrecare. My parents had decided to move interstate, so I needed a new home for me and Dylan. Centrecare provided us temporary accommodation in a really nice two bedroom duplex while we waited for a Department of Housing home to become available (we ended up staying for 14 months, so much for temporary).

Centrecare asked if I needed any furniture etc but I had my own stuff, and I said there was probably someone else who needed it more than we did.

Centrecare has really helped Dylan. He was attending school at a place for severely intellectually and physically disabled children. He didn't belong there. I wanted him to be in a "normal" school, where he looked like every other child, and where he could be given special help.

Thanks to Linda Williams, our case worker at Centrecare, she helped get Dylan into the Cloverdale Education Support Program, and the results have been amazing. His speech is clearer, he is so much happier and confident and I am over the moon that my son has children to play with and learn with.

To meet the constantly growing demand from people living in the South East and South West areas, Centrecare has opened a new, purpose built office and support centre in Gosnells. Costing more than \$3 million and officially opened at the end of 2008, the new Centre was funded by Centrecare with very generous support from Lotterywest.

Leanne Strommen, Executive Manager, Centrecare

said: "We relocated from rather cramped offices in Cannington to this new Gosnells Centre based on the needs of our clients and our Gosnells office is central to the South East Corridor for people in need of our services.

Our new Centre provides for today and for the future. We currently have 25 counsellors, case workers, outreach and property management staff, however there is room for upwards of 40 fulltime staff eventually. We now have suitable offices, meeting rooms, counselling rooms, lifeskills training facilities and educational training resources.

Centrecare provides so many children and family services. There are currently over 150 properties, not all are leased from the department of housing, we also lease from the private market for resettling refugee families.

Centrecare provides counselling for addictions, gambling, domestic violence and lifeskills training. We work with young people at risk of offending, people re-entering the community after being released from prison, migrants and refugees.
